RAGBRAI ROLLS THROUGH MOUNT PLEASANT & OT



More than 18,000 bicycle riders and support people swarmed across southern Iowa in July conquering the hills from Glenwood to Burlington. The last overnight town was Mount Pleasant.

As riders streamed down the side streets, they were welcomed by antique cars and tractors courtesy of OT and the Wayland Tractor Club, as well as a town square full of activities. Foundation Executive Director



Melinda Huisinga and her crew had her 1915 65hp Case steamed up offering Trash Can Sweet Corn. Proceeds from the sale of nearly 1,000 ears of corn went to Old Threshers and the OT Foundation. Volunteers helped monitor bathrooms and showers for those camping at McMillan Park and the OT Campground. The Heritage Museums were open and the carousel and trolleys were running. Several participants said they never knew of Old Threshers and said they planned to come back for the Reunion.

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SOUTH 40 OPENS FOR 2024 REUNION



With help from a Destination lowa Grant, a CAT Grant, Enhance Henry County Foundation Grant and financial support from the OT Foundation, Midwest Old Threshers broke ground in December starting a major campground improvement project in the South 40. A mild winter helped the project move along and the new sites opened for

reservations in July. There are 70 full hook-up sites and 30 regular sites.

Also included in the project is the refurbishment of the open-air 1779 car belonging to the Midwest Electric Railway, as well as the building a new Milan Car.

The total cost of all these improvements will be \$1.6 million.

So yes, somethings are the same here year after year.



A BOOK REVIEW FROM THE SHELVES OF THE MIDWEST OLD THRESHERS' LIBRARY

Editor's Note: This issue of the Threshers Chaff features the first of many book reviews by Threshers volunteer Joan Alt Belknap. Over the last year Joan has made a detailed list of all the books in the Old Threshers' Library in the conference room. "Many of them are amazing for different reasons. It seems a shame for them to just sit there with many people not even realizing they are there," says Joan. "The first book I thought would be great to review is The Work of Lennis Moore: Woodcut Printmaker."

Being relatively new to the Midwest Old Thresher's family, I did not have the pleasure of knowing Lennis Moore. After looking through this book and reading about him, I really can't find the words to express his massive contribution to Midwest Old Thresher's and to the art world. I thought it fitting to make this first book review about his book.

The Work of Lennis Moore: Woodcut Printmaker was published after his death, and designed and edited by Erin MacGorman Moore, with much of the text provided by daughter Catie Scott from conversations with him. Woodcut prints fill the book, starting with his first, Snow, cut while at Luther College, and ending with High Summer 2014.





Many of his works are of the farm and rural landscape. At first glance they seem to be clean and simple with minimal detail, but in Moore's own words, "You don't have to put in all the details because the mind of the viewer will add in all those details based on their own experience." I found that to be true, as my mind filled with vivid memories of my past.

Each print is accompanied by a bit of conversation from Lennis. In addition to the powerful woodcuts, an enthusiast might be interested in his process of printing which sometimes involved an antique printing press. The son of the past owners came by to take a look at the restored truck and was amazed as he always thought it was black, when indeed it was green.

This is the first year this truck is being exhibited at Old Threshers, but it's no stranger to being on display. David has taken his truck to Ohio, Michigan, Texas, and Tennesee.

David says he is looking forward to sitting with his truck and answering people's questions. He and his wife, Christine, will be joined by their youngest son as they parade in the Cavalcade of Power.

Tim found one in Minnesota and asked a friend to go pick it up. His friend was no stranger to these tractors and let Tim know that it was not the right tread width. Luckily for Tim, his friend had just the one he needed in his collection of 30 4WD tractors and they ended up swapping tractors.

The 1936 Massey Harris had been restored previously but was painted green with red wheels. In the preparations for being featured this year, the Paces had it painted gray, but it still sports red wheels.

Tim's dad is 93 and remembers driving his father's 4WD when he was little. He had to slide to the end of the seat to stop it because he was so short. Tim's dad has always talked about owning one of his own.

Tim and his wife, Konnie, will be at the Reunion along with their granddaughters who will have a MH Mustang and Pony to exhibit.

FEATURED GARDEN TRACTOR

In high school, Alex Peterson watched as his father restored a 1968 Massey Ferguson MF10 into what looks like a miniature version of a Massey Harris 1100 series tractor complete with a 3-point hitch and blade. Little did Alex know that the red tractor would be his graduation present.



FRACTIONAL HORSEPOWER - ENGINES LESS THAN A HORSE

The featured gas engine for 2024 at Midwest Old Threshers are Fractional Horsepower engines, or engines of less than one horsepower.

In order to have an engine capable of providing power for running tools and machines, it had to put out sufficient power. Most manufacturers by 1900 were focused on building gasoline engines of 2 horsepower and upwards. However, a few companies took a different approach and began offering engines of less than one horsepower, making engines of ¾, ½,



and even ¼ horsepower. The big producers ignored fractional horsepower engines, leaving the segment to new companies. Carlisle & Finch of Cincinnati, OH was an early entrant in 1897 offering ¼ hp engines as casting kits,

then later as complete operational engines. They claimed the engine was just the right size to run a lathe or small dynamo, and would do so at less expense than an electric motor or steam engine. Over the next decade, several other companies would bring other unique versions of small engines to market as well.


By the teens the engine marketplace really got interesting. Competition was driving prices lower and lower, and most companies, including the large ones, brought smaller 1 and 1-1/2 horsepower engines to the market. Some companies also brought new fractional horsepower engines, including New Holland of PA with a ½ hp model, and Gilson of WI with a 34 hp Pony.



New Holland

Elgin Wheel & Engine Co. of Elgin, IL introduced small two cycle upright engines to the market in 1911. Advertised initially as great gifts for your boy, as they were instructive, useful, and entertaining, and may also be profitable providing power to items around the farm or home. Fred Maytag happened upon an Elgin engine on display on a Chicago business trip. The idea of a washing machine with an engine, led to Maytag purchasing Elgin engines, and eventually the company. Maytag went on to make over a million fractional horsepower engines, with production ending in 1952.

Another of the big success stories for small power engines also began in the teens. First offered in 1914 in the US was the Smith motor wheel, a unique engine coupled to a wheel for the powering of a bicycle or small vehicle. Briggs & Stratton would purchase the Smith Motor Wheel in 1919, and enjoyed good sales for a few years. Looking for new markets, a stationary version of

the engine was developed in 1920. This became the prime product for Briggs & Stratton, with many models and variations

developed. Engines of ½ and ¾ horsepower were offered from the early 1920s on into the 1930s. Old Threshers is looking forward to seeing a large variety of the feature engines at the 2024 show. Maytag and Briggs & Stratton engines survived in great quantities. Examples of many of the other manufacturers of fractional horsepower engines also survive. Other small engines, such as model gas engines, are also included in the feature for the year. Truly the year of the little engine – Be sure to check them out at the show!



FEATURED GAS ENGINE EXHIBITORS FOR 2024

Our featured gas engine exhibitors for 2024 are brothers Dan and Tim Reynolds, and their dad Alan, all of Mt. Pleasant.

The start of a 5-generation collection and 50+ years of playing with engines: In the early 1970s, Earl Reynolds became the coordinator for the antique car area of Midwest Old Threshers, and in 1978 he joined the Threshers board as a director. From these early beginnings, who could have imagined that it would lead to 50+ years of collecting and playing with hundreds of gas engines. Earl, and his son Alan (pictured at right—center,) already enjoyed showing cars and tractors but Earl also wanted to get his father (Leonard), a lifetime farmer, involved in the show as more than just an observer. His method for doing this, buy him a gas engine. A 2½ hp Ottawa found in a local garage in Mt. Pleasant would do the trick. Within a couple years Earl's dad Leonard's collection had grown to about 5 engines that he would bring to the show on a custom-built wood trailer of his making from wood from his family's farm. Leonard would continue to bring and show his trailer load of engines for almost 25 years until his passing in 2001. Alan, Leonard's grandson, would spend time with Leonard at the gas engine display in between activities in car and tractor areas. Over the years, the operation of Leonard's engines transitioned to Alan, as Earl continued his support of the show on the board of directors covering various areas. After Leonard's passing, Alan took over full responsibility to continue the showing of his grandpa's engines, which have continued to be shown annually to today.

Alan's (Bev) two son's; Dan (pictured above—left) and Tim (pictured above—right,) have both took to expanding their family's interest in antique engines, each establishing their own unique collections.

Dan's Story (4th Generation): As an annual attendee of the Old Threshers reunion from birth, Alan's son Dan Reynolds grew up watching his dad run his great-grandfather's (Leonard's) engines. With the octane in his veins and fumes in his lungs, at 16 Dan decided he wanted an engine of his own. During the show that year, he set out to buy a Maytag, remembering one his dad (Alan) had and sold when he was young. He achieved his goal and bought a non-running common Maytag 92 for \$60. Over that winter, it got rebuilt and repainted and was at the show the following year. Well of course once you have one of something and you find a different variation you must have it! One year after buying his first Maytag, Dan bought a twin cylinder, again during the Old Threshers Reunion. That was it, the bug was caught, now over 20 years later, he has over 60 different (yes different) Maytag and Elgin engines that together show the evolution of the engine designs. His collection also includes several Maytag powered items, factory built by other companies who would purchase the Multi-Motors and apply them to their applications. This includes reel and rotary mowers, garden tractors, generators, and water and air pumps. Dan joined and has since been elected the President of the Maytag Collector's Club. "I never intended to start a lifelong hobby when buying that first 92, but I love the 'hunt', the stories the engines tell us, the thrill of seeing them come to life, the friends I have made and now the excitement my son (Oliver (2)) has when we fire



one up," said Dan.

Early in their relationship, Dan bought his then girlfriend, now wife, Kelly, an Iron Horse gas engine. As she worked to get it going again, the collecting bug spread, Kelly has since expanded her collection to include roughly 30 variations of Lauson Air Cooled Engines. Now the only real question is, what will their son, Oliver collect?

Tim's Story (4th Generation): "I always grew up around my family's flywheel engines and had a love for antique gas engines. As I grew up watching my brother play with Maytags, I felt I needed to collect something" Tim stated. He continued to say "When I was 12, I got my first Briggs and Stratton engine. It was a common model 6S but was a great starter engine and something to get the hobby started. I never would have imagined that one engine would lead to a collection of almost 300 different Briggs and Strattons almost 20 years later! One thing that always intrigued me about Briggs was all the different models and sub models they made and the changes along the way! You can collect your whole life and still not have them all. It's been a fun journey that has led me to a lot of fun and interesting places and to meet a lot of new friends. I'm blessed and thankful for the collection I have built so far including some very rare and low production engines. I can't wait to see what the future holds and what is left out there to find hiding in barns and on auctions to add to my fleet."

Feature Engines at long last! In the 50 years of showing engines at Midwest Old Threshers, no Reynolds owned engine has been selected as the feature show engine. With fractional horsepower engines selected in 2024 to be featured, many Maytags, Briggs and Strattons, Lausons and model engines fit into this category. A model Olds hit and miss engine from Alan's collection, a Maytag Fruit Jar engine from Dan's collection and a Briggs and Stratton Model F from Tim's collection will jointly share the feature engine honor at the Reunion. "We're very excited to have been selected as feature exhibitors for gas engines" said Dan, "I know Great-Grandpa (Leonard) and Grandpa (Earl) are both looking down on us with pride and excitement, to see how far what they started has come and that we all can share this feature honor this year." The Reynolds family intends to bring a large variety of engines from their collection to this year's Reunion and looks forward to creating more memories for generations to come.

Button Collectors' Update 2024

2024 Button Collector's Forum

Button collectors will meet for the 22nd Annual Button Collectors' forum in Colfax School on Sunday morning September 1, 2024. Colfax School is located just south of Campground Hospitality and the Theater Museum. Mark your Old Threshers daily schedule. I will be opening the building about an hour earlier to set up for the meeting.



2024 Souvenir Button Design

Aaron Bixler is the owner of the 1914 20 hp Advance engine featured on the 2024 Souvenir Button. His engine was manufactured by the Advance Thresher Company in Battle Creek, Michigan. Advance Traction Engines were manufactured from 1885 until 1917. The company was reorganized under the name Advance-Rumely in 1915.

A friend located this engine on a farm near Navada, Missouri. The engine was for sale, so Aaron and his friend hopped on a plane and flew down to check it out. A month later, Aaron was the proud owner of the engine.

It took about six months to get it into running condition. Although it didn't need a complete restoration, a good deal of mechanical work was required including adding a boiler jacket and canopy. This year, we get to see the results of Aaron's hard work in action.

2024 Button Design Artist

Steven Paul Mendenhall, a native of Mount Pleasant, is the

artistic designer of the 2024 button. Steve has been involved in many Old Threshers areas and programs since 1985. He is the long-time digital layout designer of the Old Threshers button. This is Steve's fourth year as the button's major designer, designing both the engine portrait



and the button layout. He has been a member of the Old Threshers button design team since 1987.

Steve's initials appear on the button, but you might need a magnifying glass, or maybe the giant Souvenir button to find it!

The exceptional skills of the Old Threshers button designer ensures that Old Threshers buttons are created with a very high standard of design quality rarely present in similar event pin-backs. The hours the artists spend on the button projects continue to be noticed and appreciated among the many Old Threshers visitors and button collectors. I think this is one of the reasons button collecting is so popular with Old Threshers attendees.

2024 Button Construction

The 56 mm diameter button is constructed as many previous buttons have been—a plastic coated paper formed over a metal shell and held together by a silver-colored metal backing disk. The attached silver-colored pin has the loop style catch.

Button Varieties

As of late May 2024, no new varieties of past years button have been reported.

Our collector's group's sharp-eyed variety collectors keep me up to date on new varieties for the current and past years. So far, no varieties of the 2024 button have been discovered, but major or minor varieties may turn up closer to the Reunion date, or during the Reunion.

2024 Engine of the Year Special Souvenir Button

Due to the continuing popularity of the giant four-inch buttons, Old Threshers has issued a limited quantity of the 2024 Souvenir button in the large format. This fifteenth "giant button" makes an interesting supplemental button for the core collection. It also allows one to view the artwork in greater detail. These giant buttons have limited availability from the Old Threshers Gift Shop and official OT souvenir stands while supplies last.

Official Supplements

The 10-hour Volunteer button for 2024 coordinates with the colors of the main Souvenir button (blue and white) The button measures 56 mm in diameter with a name window. Interesting fact: Terry McWilliams reports that the 10-hour Volunteer button is produced by a different company than the one that manufactures the souvenir button. Although they use the same Pantone color system, the blue on the 10-hour Volunteer button appears slightly darker.

The 10-hour Volunteer button is given by Old Threshers to

those individuals who have completed (or will complete) their 10-hour volunteer commitment to Old Threshers prior to the opening of the Reunion. The 2025 "volunteer year" begins at the end of the 2024 Reunion. I don't get involved in the details of these Old Threshers programs, but someone at the Old Threshers office can give you more information on how to apply for this volunteer program. Old Threshers is always looking for volunteers to help prepare for and put away after the Reunion.

In late May, the 2024 Exhibitor/Staff button was unavailable for examination. In past years, this oval name-window button has closely resembled the design of the Volunteer Button. An attached, coordinating ribbon will identify the main Old Threshers activity area of the wearer.



Both the Volunteer Button and the E/S Button and Ribbon are earned for volunteer work at Old Threshers, and tend to remain in the collections of the individuals who earned them. Old Threshers has never sold either of these buttons. These supplemental buttons do, on occasion, show up in the secondary market; but collectors must hunt diligently for them. If you are interested in earning either or both of these volunteer buttons, contact the Old Threshers Office, the first step in becoming involved in Old Threshers rewarding volunteer service.

THE STORY OF LITTLE TOOT: RESTORING A HALF-SCALE RUMELY

In 1975, at 10-years-old, Pub Melsha found himself on a bus from Cedar Rapids, IA to Hamilton, MO to learn how to operate a 4HP, half-scale, Rumely steam engine. Knowing his obsession with the model steam engines at the Midwest Old Threshers Reunion, Pub's father and grandfather purchased the engine for him, picking both the youngster and engine up later that week. Built in 1964, and lovingly nick-named "Little Toot," the model engine has never missed a Reunion.

Little Toot has been driven and ridden by nearly everyone who has grown up in the Steam Area. Over the past fifty years, Little Toot likely has traveled more miles than any other engine on the grounds. It has engaged many young children in steam, often pulling a wagon where guests, young and old, enjoy rides. Almost everyone in the steam area has a memory involving Little Toot.

During the 2023 Reunion, the 4HP Rumely appeared a little tired and worn down. At this point, Pub and his daughter Sarah, the father-daughter owners, decided it was time for restoration.

- Toot's restoration began in February 2024 with the removal of Little Toot's wheels by Ryker Carruthers and Pub Melsha.

- Once the wheels were completed, they were pinstriped by Sarah Melsha and Ryker Carruthers.
- Sarah spent the winter in her garage painting the rest of the engine.
- The wheels returned from Lenox in June, and the engine, now fully painted, had its wheels reattached by Pub, Sarah,

and Tyler Pender.

- The rest of the engine was pinstriped, and the brass polished by Sarah Melsha, with help from Ryker Carruthers.
- Little Toot now boasts a custom gauge created by Ryker Carruthers.
- Little Toot has a new wooden "seat" on the coal bunker created by Kenny Hansen.
- Little Toot features hand-painted lettering on the tanks by Hugh Hoffman of Mount Vernon, Iowa.
- Little Toot has other new amenities that we are excited to present at Old Threshers.

Toot's water wagon and two hayracks were also rebuilt, painted, and pinstriped this winter.

Little Toot's first show after its restoration was in Grand Mound, IA, at Eastern Iowa Threshers, just a week after its completion.



J. F. Chuse was the foreman of the machine shop for the Indianapolis & St. Louis Railroad. In 1874, he partnered with a fellow machinist, Richard Heap, and they formed a business named Chuse & Company.

They initially did general machining, repairs and began manufacturing small pumps. In 1890 they started manufacturing steam engines to power threshing machines that were pulled by 8 and 10 horse teams.

By 1892 Chuse & Company had begun building high speed steam engines to power generators in power plants. In 1900 the company was reorganized as the Chuse Engine & Manufacturing Company.
